Education

Having made a big impact in Leeds with the **One Life** and **Perspective** courses, leadership packs are now available for free thinking groups around the country to run the courses for themselves.

A leadership pack is currently being developed for the **Answers** course which has run for the second year in a row, taking place in May at the University of Leeds.

We are also planning to develop our new Intimate Details course, which is an answer to UCCF's Pure course. Pure is taught on campuses across the UK despite it openly teaching against homosexuality. Intimate Details will provide an alternative for those who want to discuss the real issues in the modern day – from every day issues like handling break ups to taboos such as incest and BDSM.

Education is taking place on a national level directly too – June saw our first **Enquiry Conference** which was targeted at atheists, humanists, sceptics and free thinkers. They were all brought together in Birmingham with an array of speakers including Professor A. C. Grayling, Professor Chris French, Dr Antony Lempert and many others.

September will see the first

Sunrise Conference, an event
designed to bring together the
leaders and shapers of free
thinking groups across the
country in order to share ideas
and build stronger groups. Dozens
of guest speakers have already
been confirmed for the event.
Speakers including, founding
National Federation of Atheist
and Humanist and Secular
Student Societies (AHS) president
Norman Ralph will be present.

Resources

Launched in April, Atheist
Stock is the world's only stock
photography website designed
specifically for free thinking
groups. Whether you need a
photo of Conway Hall, Richard
Dawkins or the One Life course in
action you'll find it all, available
for free, on Atheist Stock.

With the AHS still struggling to produce it's own materials, **Secular Portal**, the site responsible for the formation of the organisation is still the premiere destination for free thinking students in the UK to discuss and share knowledge. In July, we also launched the **Resource Library** containing hundreds of sample documents

and talks for groups to use.

To make it easier for local groups to understand the range of resources we offer, we launched our **Guide for Groups** publication in February at the AHS national convention in Oxford. This explains the various resources and information that we provide.

In July, we announced the appointment of Michael Burgess as Director of Education. Michael will be starting with a complete review of the resources we provide to local groups so we can better identify where we can improve the materials we are providing.

Humanism

In June, we appointed a new Coordinator of the **Humanist Action Group**, Katie Barr. Katie took over the management of coordinating the group's activities and began by expanding the range of activities undertaken, including our recently launched blood drive.

At the Enquiry 2010 Conference, Chris unveiled plans for the **Humanist Chaplaincy Network**. This is a network of volunteer chaplains across the UK brought together to share knowledge and resources. Full training will be provided to volunteers at the upcoming Sunrise Conference.

However, the biggest

development in our humanist activities this year was the launch of **Humanist Community** in February. This is a secular alternative to church that provides everything you would expect in terms of a great place to go on a Sunday morning and new people to meet – but strictly without any of the religion, preaching or dogma!

The concept has proved extremely popular and the group is already as well attended as the local humanist group. It has also attracted much local media attention with the group being covered by both the BBC and local newspapers.

In April, trustees Chris and Gijsbert sat down with both the British Humanist Association and the National Secular Society to introduce the organisation and to begin building bridges between us and the various other national organisations.

Charitable Status

In July, the foundation's application for registered charity status was approved by the Charity Commission for England and Wales. This is in addition to our HMR&C charity status and now makes us registered charity 1137220.

Office

Last month, we launched the first foundation office based in Leeds city centre. The office will act as a hub for the organisation's activities, providing a place for volunteers to work.

We've also enjoyed a fantastic response from our advertisements to recruit volunteers, with scores of people applying to give their time to helping the foundation and its projects.



Newsletter

In July, we published the first edition of our newsletter, Engage, which features four pages of news, event coverage and commentary. The newsletter allows supporters of the organisation to keep up to date with our activities quickly and easily. The next issue will be released in October.

Dr Gijsbert Stoet


Gijsbert is a lecturer at the **University of Leeds**, working in the Institute of Psychological Sciences.
